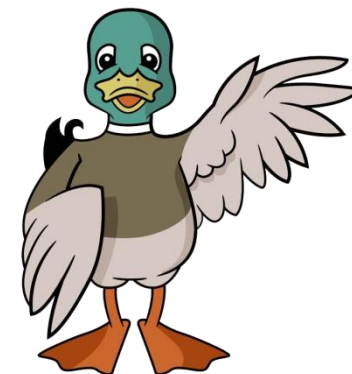

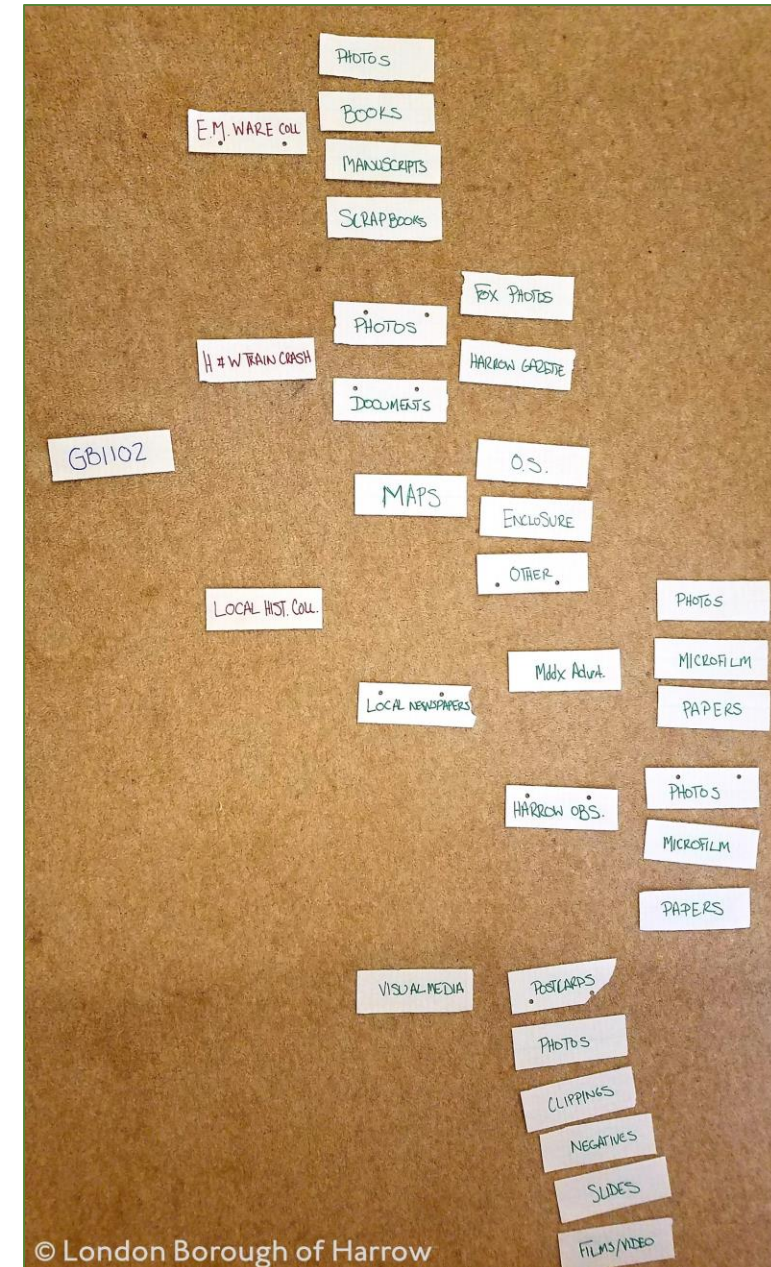

Did you know that Headstone Manor and Museum used to be a farm? That's why at the museum we have two barns, the Great Barn and the Small Barn. The Granary, which you can see a picture of below, used to be at a different farm called Pinner Park farm and was moved to Headstone Manor nearly 30 years ago. Tube Farm Animals! Chicken

**HEADSTONE

YOU WILL NEED:
CARDBOARD TUBE
PENS AND PENCILS
SCISSORS
COLOURED PAPER/CARD
SELLOTAPE/GLUE

STEP ONE:
WRAP THE CARDBOARD TUBE
IN WHITE PAPER

STEP TWO:
CUT A TRIANGLE OUT OF
ORANGE PAPER TO MAKE A
BEAK AND STICK TO THE
MIDDLE OF THE TUBE. THEN
USE A BLACK PEN TO DRAW
HIM SOME EYES!

STEP THREE:
CUT OUT 2 CIRCLES TO USE
AS FEET AND ATTACH THEM
TO THE BOTTOM OF THE
TUBE

STEP FOUR:
CUT OUT SOME RED CARD (OR
WHITE PAPER AND COLOUR IN
RED, OR PIPECLEANERS) AND
ATTACH TO THE TOP OF THE
TUBE!

A message from....
Bill the Duck!



Hi there! 🙋 There's just so much glass to show you that I couldn't fit it all into one day! Whitefriars didn't just make glass objects, they also designed and made stained glass windows which can now be found all over the world, I've heard there's even one with my cousins the Kangaroos down under! In 2016 the museum people worked with over 100 young people from Harrow in a Young Roots project to learn all about the history and heritage of Whitefriars. They worked with the last Chief Designer and Manager of the Stained Glass Studio, Alf Fisher OBE, to design and create a piece that shows off all sorts of Harrow history! It's displayed in our Moat Cafe now, have a look next time you're picking up my duck food!

The museum has a very special 19th Century sketch book in it's collection - it belonged to James Powell, the owner of Whitefriars himself. The team here worked with the Museum of London to have the sketch book digitised - they even made a video & blog about it!

I think I might install one of these windows into my duck house, what do you think?

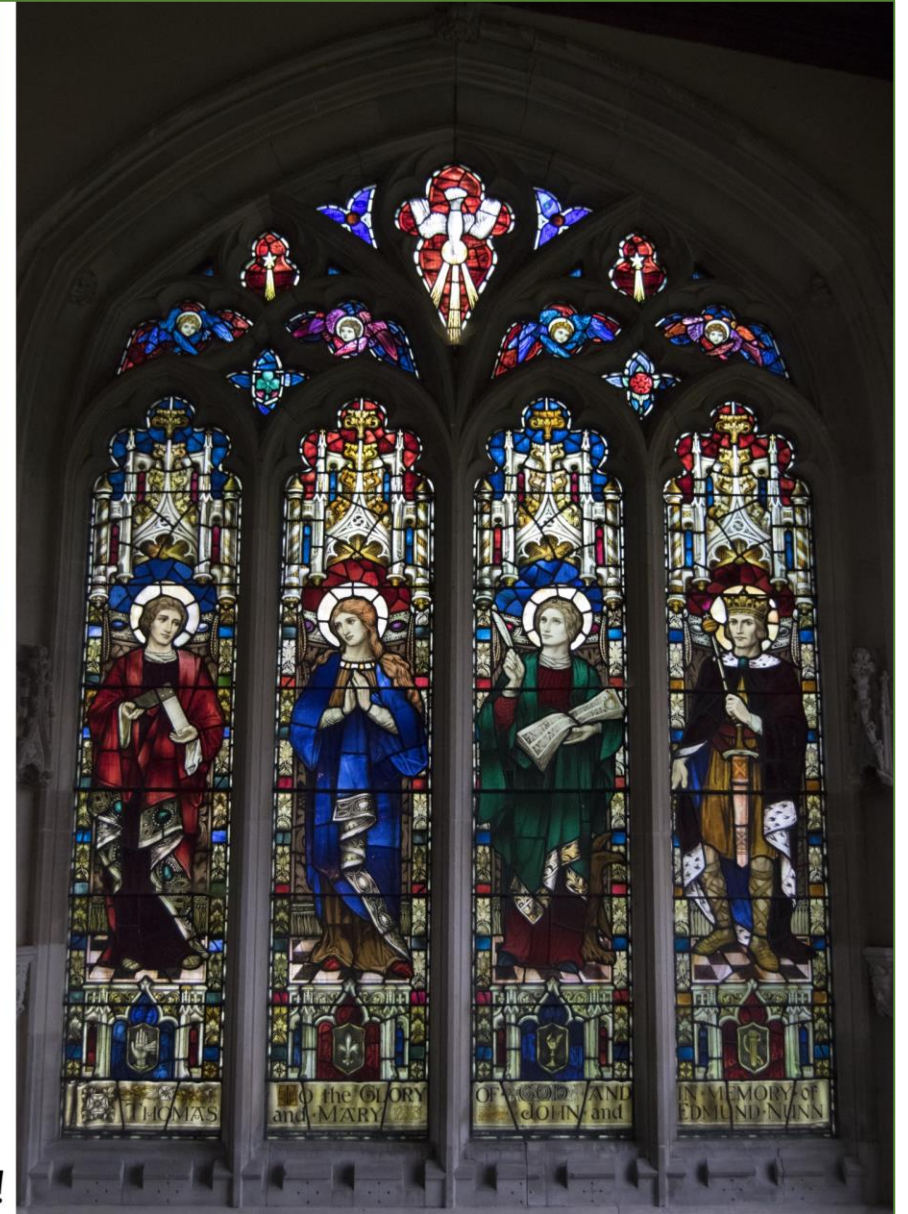


We have lots of original drawings for stained glass windows in the Museum collection.

Many windows designed by Whitefriars are still visible today – like this one at St Peter & St Paul Basingbourn in Cambridge!

But how do you get from drawing to window??

Let's follow the Young Roots project to find out!





First you design your window on paper. This is called a 'cartoon'.

Whitefriars artists took inspiration from all over, as you can see from this sketchbook by James Powell himself!

Next you cut and form the lead comes which hold the glass in place for your design.

You can see the soldered lead comes surrounding this piece of sample stained glass.

Raw coloured glass lumps, called 'cullet' are melted down and blown into a 'Norman slab glass' mould, right.

Then the individual slabs are cut from the blown-mould, and broken into pieces to fit the window sections!

Finally the pieces are secured and the lead comes soldered together. Isn't it beautiful? This window now hangs in the Museum café!

Hello Time Travellers! 🙌 We're moving away from the Whitefriars room today and moving into the Metroland room, taking another step back in time. This room used to be a nursery when the house was still lived in, something that the Museum team discovered when they found children's alphabet wallpaper underneath some more modern wallpaper. Now this room is used to tell our visitors all about the Metroland.

'The Metroland' was a name given to Harrow and some other local areas when the Metropolitan Railway was built to connect the area with Central London in 1863. The area used to be very rural but when the railway was built people could get into London much quicker and so they started to move out here to live! Many of the houses you see in Harrow now were designed and built during this period. Check out the maps, can you spot where you live now, and what it used to be like before?

This time was also when most of the factories that Harrow is well known for started to pop up, as there was now a workforce to support them, transportation links for supplies, and fresh water and lots of land to build on. More on those factories next week!

This room now
explores Harrow in the
1930s, but was once
a nursery!

This room has two objects from our Large Object Store on display: a gas cooker and a kitchen cupboard.

The shape of the Gas Light and Coke Company (GLC) gas cooker (1937) was inspired by the aerodynamic contours of vehicles!

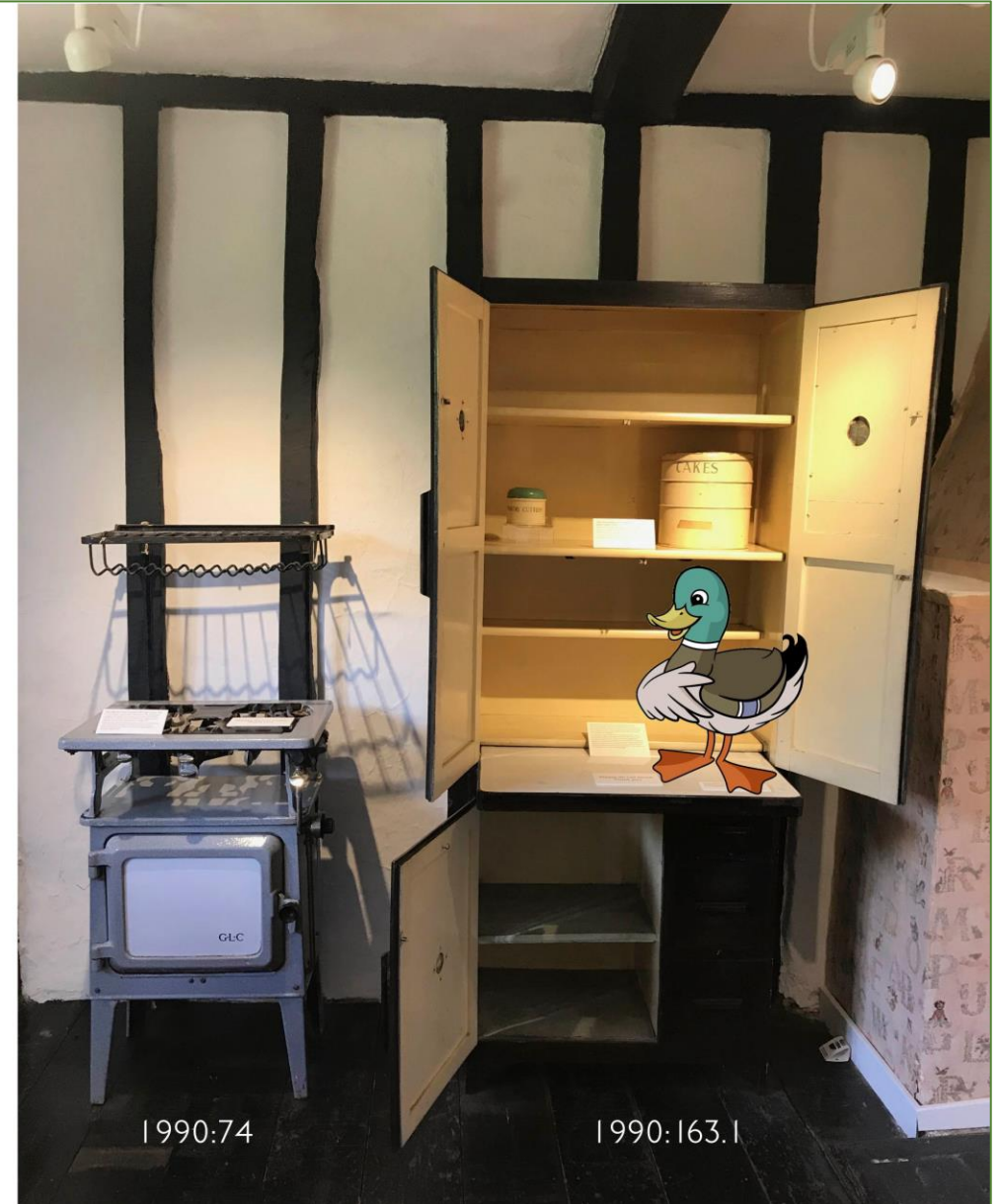
I always get excited when I see the Tala cake tin on the shelf in the cupboard! And then I remember that there aren't any cakes left 😞

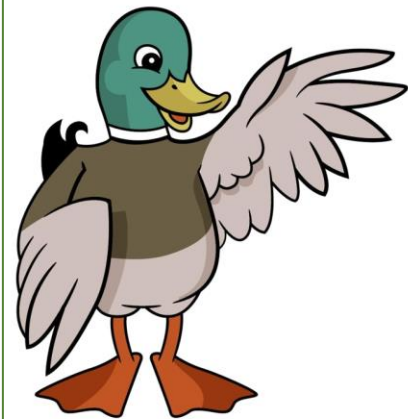




Check it out!

The map on the top is from 1895, and the one on the bottom is the exact same area in 1935.

Can you believe the difference 40 years made?



Can you spot a bit of Headstone's moat at the top of both maps?



Detective Bill is back spotting some more things around your house? Remember the indoor bingo game from a few weeks ago? He asked you to spot something to paint with in your house, did you find something?

Winsor and Newton paint factory was built in Wealdstone in 1937! Harrow had loads of factories and was a good place for people to live because there was lots of jobs.

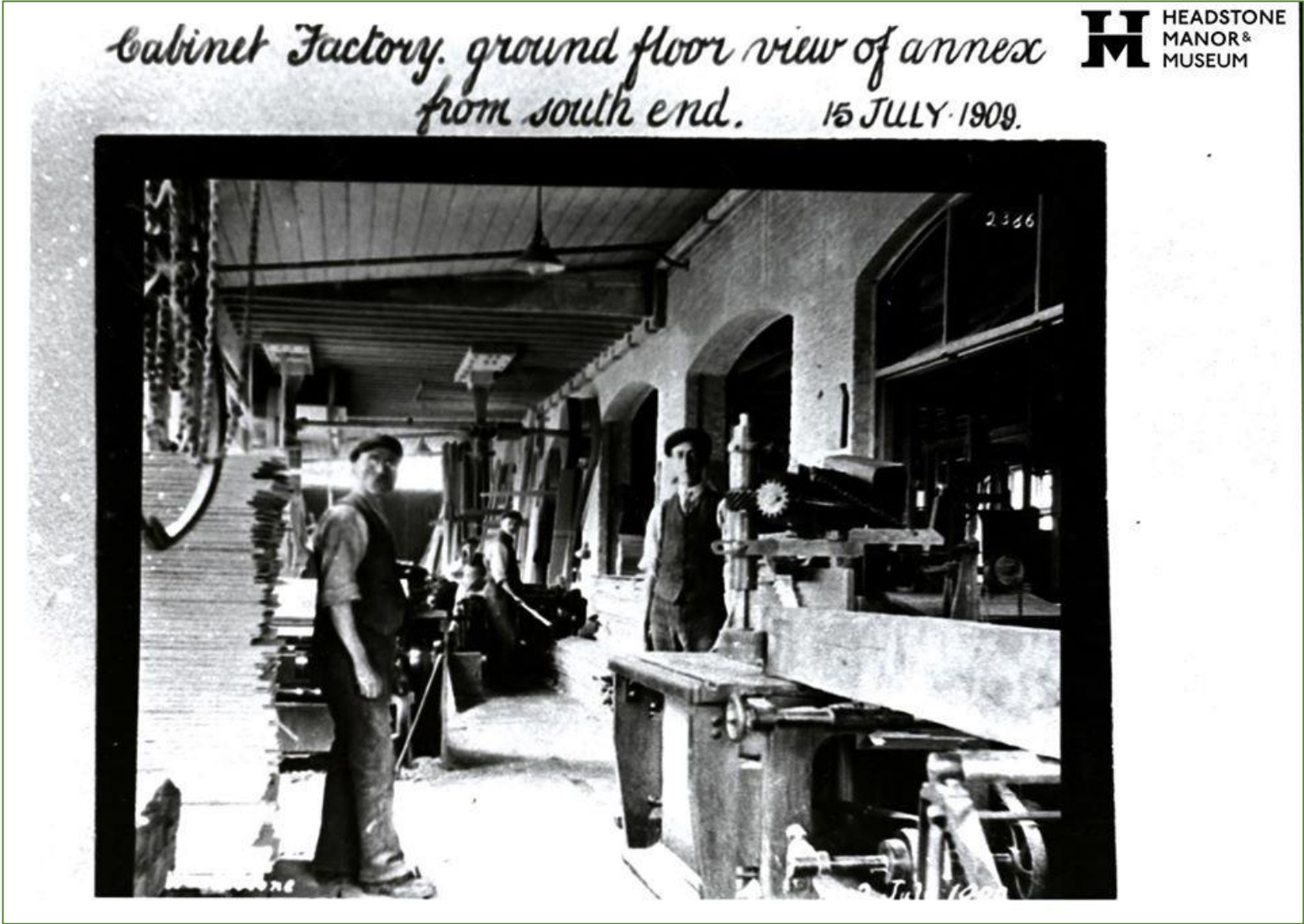
Winsor and Newton make arty things like paint and ink. They still make paints even though the factory in Wealdstone closed in 2011. The building is now lots of different workspaces including an artist studio and gallery called the Whitefriars studio! Have a look at some of the artists work here: <https://buff.ly/2SoA7Mc>

Can you make your own paintbrush? Try using different materials for the bristles and see how it changes the effect of the paint! Which is your favourite?

You could even try making your own paints. There are lots of different recipes for paint using things from your kitchen or use natural things like berries to make different colours.
